ULIA Roberts is shocking audiences in her new film with her eye-popping outfits and in-your-face attitude — but she's not nearly as wild as the real-life Erin Brockovich.

The feisty legal investigator who inspired the new hit movie *Erin Brockovich* has a life that's even crazier than the sexy star who plays her.

Erin, a tough-talking, exbeauty queen and single mother of three, even made Julia blush with her trademark cleavage-baring outfits.

"The day I got there, I was like, 'That's a shirt?' "recalls Julia about her first meeting with the blond bombshell.

Erin was a low-wage employee at a small law firm before she took on a billion-dollar corporation. Even as she dug up evidence for the lawsuit, she never once toned down her wardrobe or stopped her cursing.

Erin has had three husbands — including Steve Brown and Steve Brockovich, neither of whom, she claims, ever paid child support and is now wed to a professional dancer, Eric Ellis.

Her ex-mother-in-law still complains because Erin still uses her son's name, but Erin just laughs it off in her nononsense style. "She didn't like me then and she doesn't like me now. Get over the ego! You think I want to spend the rest of my life with the name Brockovich?"

Erin adds she would have changed her name, but "it would have cost me 725 bucks and I said, 'Forget it. It's just a name.'

Erin played a major part in helping the people of the small Californian desert town of Hinckley win a judgement of \$333 million against a giant utility company for poisoning them and their water supply with cancer-causing chemicals.

The plucky investigator even fell victim to the highlytoxic chromium pollution herself because of the many trips she made to Hinckley.

"I would develop these nosebleeds and get a strange rash on my arms and chest. For a while, they thought I had a weird form of viral meningitis. Now I have a benign tumor in my nose and a suppressed immune system. I dismissed it at first but, frankly, it scares me.
